Sunday Scriptures - First Reading - When this was written Jerusalem lay in ruins and the plight of God's people was like that of a widow deprived of her children. It announces a joyful feast of God and his people.

Second Reading - St Paul tells us that, though there are many different gifts among us, they all come from God's Spirit, and should be used for the good of all.

Gospel - This relates the first of the signs given by Jesus, when at a wedding in Cana he changed water into wine at the request of his mother.

Sunday Reflection - In its Jewish context 'Peace' or 'Shalom' captures the idea of life, the promotion of all that is truly human. Where human beings are flourishing the kingdom of God is there. Wedding, bridegroom and wine combine to draw attention to one aspect of peace: good relations between people. particularly apt as we are in the Week of Prayer and work of Christian Unity.

Winter is the time of gray, velvet weather drifting towards us. It arrives on 'little cat feet' and curls itself around us like the fog in Sandburg's poem. The weather is a friend if you make it one. I look forward to the gray, quiet time for solitude, contemplation, reading, long conversations with friends. Colors are softer, sounds have more depth, the pace is gentler. Instead of resentment at the lack of sun, snuggle into the gray velvet quilt and make vourself a cun of tea

Seeing your Life through the Lens of the Gospel

1. The story is a story of abundance, the abundance of blessings God gives us. How have you been aware of the abundance of God's blessings? Let the memories lead you to prayer of thanks and praise for the times in your life when that joy and fulfilment have been very real to you.

2. The hour of Jesus had not yet come when the glory of God was revealed in the sign that took place. For us also the revelation of the full glory of God lies in the future, but we do get glimpses along the way. Recall some of the signs that have revealed to you something of the glory of God, e.g., nature, art, friendship, etc.

3. Mary/Jesus. It is interesting to note that despite the apparent rebuff, Mary is the first person in the narrative to show (at the level of the action of the story) that the correct response to the presence of Jesus is to trust in him. When have you trusted in the word of Jesus like that? What relationships do you have that you can trust like that? Do you recall times when your trust was rewarded even when you had been initially disappointed?
