## Sunday Scriptures

**First Reading** - The prophet, speaking in God's name, promises the people that if they show concern for others especially the poor then their light will break forth like the dawn.

**Second Reading** - Paul tells the Corinthians that when he brought them the message of the Gospel he didn't rely on his own cleverness but on the power of God.

**Gospel** - Christ tells his disciples that they must let the light of their good deeds shine for all to see, yet let God have all the glory.

**SUNDAY REFLECTION** - We can easily see how Jesus should be the light of the world. Even though the words are familiar, we are perhaps unaccustomed to reflecting on ourselves as the light of the world and salt of the earth. This is an act of profound trust in us by God. Jesus has faith in us to be bearers of his Good News in our time. How are we to be that? Not first by our words or even by our deeds. We are the light and salt on account of who we are as disciples. As the Gospel text puts it, a city built on a hilltop cannot be hidden. We cannot help being seen as his disciples, for that is who we are.

### • Thought for the Day •

In a world where the poor are increasingly numerous, we paradoxically see the growth of a wealthy elite, living in a bubble of comfort and luxury, almost in another world compared to ordinary people. This means that a culture still persists - sometimes well disguised - that discards others without even realizing it and tolerates with indifference that millions of people die of hunger or survive in conditions unfit for human beings. A few years ago, the photo of a lifeless child lying on a Mediterranean beach caused an uproar; unfortunately, apart from some momentary outcry, similar events are becoming increasingly irrelevant and seen as marginal news items.

Seven ways to pray about human trafficking


1. Pray for every-one who has been trafficked
